## Lesson 9

Long Vowels

## (Read this page to your student.)

Each of the following groups of words gives practice in articulating long vowel sounds. As you read the words to your student aloud, make each sound clear and distinct.
All the words in this group have the same, or nearly the same vowel sound. Have your student practice reading each word aloud until able to pronounce them all correctly. Listen carefully while your student reads to you. Have the student practice the pronunciation of these words as much as necessary.
Be sure to tell your student which words you had difficulty understanding. Have your student make a list of the words she or he has difficulty pronouncing, and practice saying them correctly. Once you feel they are being pronounced correctly, dictate a few of them. As you
say each word, have your student write those words down on a piece of paper.
Do not become discouraged if the student does not get them all correct. If your student misses many words, then she or he is not enunciating them correctly. Remember, people write and spell the way they speak. After a brief rest, have your student repeat each word slowly. Exaggerate and drag out each letter in every word, and give another dictation. Listening is the very key to learning to read.
It's the short vowel sounds that trip up most people. It takes practice, but learning to hear the difference in vowel sounds can be mastered very, easily and quickly. After all, if the vowel is not long, then it must be short!
